DR. JULIUS ZANT FROM THE MAIL BAG

I am writing this letter about my oldest brother Dr. Julius Zant. I know that everyone has heard of the great Dr. Ben Carson. But Dr. Carson is not the only Black neurosurgeon in the state of Maryland. My brother Dr. Julius Zant was born and raised in Baltimore City and Anne Arundel County. We lived in Pasadena.

He started college at Anne Arundel Community College for two years. He was one of the first Blacks to attend there. Then he went to the University of Maryland for two years and then the University of Maryland Medical School for two years. He did his internship at the University of Maryland and his residency at Syracuse University. My brother then worked at a hospital in California for five years before an earthquake sent him back home to Maryland. He is now the chief of neurosurgery at Peninsula Regional Medical Center in Salisbury, Md.

I have no idea how my mother put him through school, but my whole family is very proud of him because he is a great role model.—Timothy Zant
