## Biographical Note by The HistoryMakers®

Calvin Lamont Giles was born on July 10, 1962 in Chicago, Illinois. His mother, Betty, was a stewardess, and his father, Louis, was active in the Civil Rights Movement. Giles attended Resurrection Grade School and Holy Trinity High School. He became involved with local Chicago politics at an early age by working in the office of his uncle, Percy Giles, Alderman of Chicago's 37th Ward. While working for his uncle, Giles had the opportunity to work on the mayoral campaign of Harold Washington.

In 1993, Giles was appointed to the Illinois House of Representatives, replacing the deceased Robert LeFlore. He was elected to the same office the following year. He co-sponsored a bill to appropriate \$10 million toward the construction of a new library in Oak Park, Illinois. He serves as Chairperson of the Committee on Local Government and as a member of the Committees on Aging and Elementary & Secondary Education. He is also active with the Young Democrats of Illinois.

Married, Giles has received several awards, including "Legislator of the Year," presented by the 37th Ward Organization, as well as awards of appreciation from Chicago State University and the Chicago Teachers Union.

Giles was interviewed by *The HistoryMakers* on August 9, 2000.

# **Detailed Description of the Collection**

#### **Series I: Original Interview Footage**

Video Oral History Interview with The Honorable Calvin Giles, Section A2000\_051\_001\_001, TRT: 0:28:13?

Calvin Giles was born on July 10, 1962 in Chicago, Illinois, the oldest child of Betty and Louis Giles. He was raised by his grandmother intermittently for ten years in Arkansas, because his mother traveled frequently for work. His parents did not marry until Giles was older, and he did not develop a closer relationship with his father until adulthood. Giles describes early childhood memories in Chicago and shares his interests as a young man. His father was active in the Civil Rights Movement in the 1960s; his uncle was Alderman Percy Giles of the 37th Ward in Chicago and the director of a community organization, the West Side Business Improvement Organization. Along with his uncle, Giles credits Mayor Harold Washington as helping shape his political philosophy and career.

Giles campaigned for Washington in 1983 and 1987, and Washington encouraged Giles to consider public service.

Calvin Giles talks about his political influences, which includes his family's political activism in the Civil Rights Movement, and the work of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. He then talks about his mentors in the Illinois General Assembly, including former Illinois Representatives Paul Williams and Arthur Turner. Giles speaks about his goals for his West Side community of Chicago and his desire to educate young people on the political process. Lastly, Giles describes his hopes for the African American community and his West Side of Chicago community.
